



## STUDENT CHECKLIST

If you are interested – turn to your VET-provider for more information
Find a potential employer and research the employer (with e.g. a online meeting) Initial discussion together with both employer and VET-provider before entering into an employment is always a good idea (to see if the workplace meets the requirements and is suitable for an apprenticeship agreement)
Find out what kind of <b>documents</b> you need when working abroad and undertaking an international apprenticeship period? Do you need a <b>visa or other permits</b> ? <b>Regulations</b> need to be checked if the workplace is in a non-EU country
An <b>employment contract</b> needs to be made – make sure you are aware of salary, work hours, workplace safety, need of own equipment tools etc. before signing a contract
The mapping of the apprenticeship period and the <b>apprenticeship agreement</b> is done together with the VET-provider and the employer – with information and discussion about aims, curricula, assessment and documentation
Remember to check current regulations regarding <b>insurances</b> (The student's insurance coverage must be secured in advance before the period)
Find out what the regulations are regarding <b>taxes</b>
Check if a temporary foreign <b>social security number</b> and <b>bank account</b> is needed when working abroad?
Check if you can get a <b>travel grant from an Erasmus + project at the VET-providers</b> when working abroad
Check needs for <b>vaccinations</b> before going abroad but also when coming back home
Prepare your language skills and check if there are <b>language/translation challenges</b> in agreements, assessments and at the workplace
Do you need a <b>driver's licence</b> ? Is your national one approved in another country
Find <b>accommodation</b> for your stay abroad
Do the travel arrangements and also look into where you are going to stay, find out routes and how you will commute to the workplace (walk, car, bus/train etc.)
Workplace safety - do you need to bring certain gear or other kinds of equipment?
Be aware and prepare for a different culture (both country <b>and work)</b>
When the period is coming to an end, make sure you have all needed documents back with you
